


Hope this finds everyone well and enjoying slightly warmer weather.

Churchyard discovery update....

Following on from last months newsletter and the wonderful clay pipe discovery.... Thank you to Sue for sharing with us details of The National Pipe Archive. Interestingly Sue's son understands that pipe stems were regularly broken, or sawn, off by the owners as the stem got bunged up with 'gunge'. So what started as a long stem would grow shorter. Also that people doing 'smelly' jobs liked apipe with a bowl near the nose as the smoke would disguise the bad odours. We have asked the National Archive for help dating the pipe, sharing photographs with them, and we will let you know how we get on. Remembering the babies and children with no marked graves

Through the Heritage Project oral history conversations we discovered that a number of babies and young children were buried in Escrick Churchyard over a number of years, but had no marked graves. We would therefore like to remember them with a permanent memorial plaque. Myers Monumental Masons from Wheldrake have very kindly offered to provide a suitably engraved York stone plaque. The plaque will be placed in the Churchyard to the left of the path, when entering from the Lychgate (old bus stop). When the stone is ready and larger numbers are allowed to meet, we will arrange a date for a short ceremony to which all will be invited.
