Unveiling of the Churchyard memorial remembering the 'Babies and Children' with no marked graves Monday 9th August. 2pm in Escrick Churchyard


Everyone very welcome to the short service which will be led by Lay Reader Chris Elliott and the unveiling of the plaque. During the recording of the Oral history conversations, we became aware that for many years babies and children had been buried in a particular area of the churchyard but there was no permanent memorial for them. The PCC were moved by this and have arrange for a plaque to be placed in the Churchyard near the lych-gate. Huge thank you to J W Myers monumental masons from Wheldrake who have very kindly donated, and will install, the plaque. If anyone knows families who may have babies or children buried in the Churchyard, please do let them know. Thank you. Refreshment will be available in Church afterwards.

Escrick Parish Magazines from the 1890's


Thanks to the generosity of a number of people, Escrick Heritage now has bound copies of the Escrick Parish magazines from 1893, 1894, 1895, 1895-96 and 1897. They make very interesting reading, especially the first ones which contain more detail. The latest copy was bought by Therese from York in an auction bundle. Therese contacted us through our website to very kindly return the 1895 copy to its original home. Thank you so much Therese. From information within the bound copies it seems that the village magazine started in 1893 when Rev Fawkes was Rector. There was a cost for the monthly magazine and a circulation of around 125. At the end of the year it seems if you handed your copies back to the Rector together with 1s (5p in new money) you were provided with a bound copy, which included stories, hymns, readings, gardening tips and much more. The books will be available for all to have a look through at the Escrick Heritage meetings and Heritage Hub afternoons.



Thomas Green.... the story continues

You may remember a few months ago reading about Thomas Green, the young man who's grave is in our Churchyard, and who's father had an iron works 'Thomas Green of Leeds and London'.
