

We are really pleased to have been given for our community archive the WW1 medals of Private Tom Hodgson Ellar. Thank you very much to Mr Ken Saynor.



From the Churchyard records we know that the Ellar family had connections with Escrick from the late 1880's to at least the 1930's and also that the family contributed to the cost of the war memorial in the Churchyard.

Tom's parents, Robert and Lenora died in the 1930's and are buried in Escrick Churchyard. Tom was one of at least 10 children, 8 boys and 2 girls. The 1911 census shows Tom was 17, single and a helper in the stables.

Tom and five of his brothers fought in the First World War and the information we have about them is:

ARTHUR HILL ELLAR (1892-1972) Private, Kings Royal Rifle Corps. BENJAMIN ELLAR (1881-1939) Corporal, Royal Garrison Artillery. He was awarded the British and Victory medals.

RAYMOND ELLAR (1894-1977) Corporal, Prince of Wales's Own (West Yorkshire) Regiment. Raymond first served in the Balkans. In 1915 he was reported missing and his papers indicate he was a prisoner of war with the rank of Lance Sergeant, in hospital at Righa, Turkey where he remained until December 1918. Raymond received the Silver War Badge and the Victory, British and Star medals.

ROBERT ELLAR Private, Army Service Corps.

Robert was just 20 when he enlisted in 1914 and he received the 1915 Star medal. TOM HODGSON ELLAR Private, Prince of Wales's Own (West Yorkshire) Regiment. Tom received the British and Victory medals. From photographs shared in our community archive it looks as though the Ellar family enjoyed sport. Ray Ellar was in the football team in 1922, could this be the Raymond Ellar who was prisoner of war?
